



## Aviation Issue Aired at Closed Session

The County Aviation Authority closed its doors yesterday for a discussion of policy in the case of Alfred Dana Jr., real estate developer, who has asked recording of land west of the

After the closed-door meeting — which lasted about aminutes — Sam Bucklew, the chairman, indicated the author

Dana, in his plea to county commissioners, said plans for t \$200 million garden type apartment development of some 60 units are complete and that financing has been arranged. Dana, who developed the Dana Shores subdivision west of the airport, actually has two pieces of land where the zoning change is sought. One is within the city limits and is already zoned for apartments and the other is just across county line.
